Worms & drones feature at Stanthorpe Node launch

Supporting the resilience of the Granite Belt community is a key focus of the Southern Queensland and Northern New South Wales (SQNNNSW) Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub’s Stanthorpe-based Node, which was officially launched this month. SQNNNSW Hub Director Professor John McVeigh said the Node would leverage research and a highly involved and motivated farming and agribusiness sector. At the official Node launch, hosted by the Granite Belt Growers Association on 15 November, farmers, business and community members had the chance to hear more about current and upcoming projects.



“The Hub is supporting a proof-of-concept project, exploring the viability of using drones to identify downy mildew in grapevines,” Professor McVeigh said.


“Our Stanthorpe Node is also working with industry and growers to trial the potential benefits on on-farm worm farms, including a comparison of soil, plant health and yields under commercial conditions.”

Planning for Success

As part of improving drought preparedness, producers at Teelba and Wallumbilla in Queensland's Maranoa region joined the teams from the SQNNSW Innovation Hub's Roma (Southern Queensland Landscapes) and Armidale (University of New England) nodes, the Queensland and Australian Government's GrazingFutures Livestock Business Resilience, Bush Agribusiness and Rural Solutions Queensland on November 2 and 3. The days were a great chance for producers to learn more about Queensland's new drought resilience planning process and available grants, teamed with information on how to create a plan for their rural businesses, available tools for record keeping and interrogating weather forecasts, and to improve skills in grazing management and forage budgeting. Grazing Naturally

The Stanthorpe Node worked with the Traprock Growers Association and Condamine Headwaters Landcare Association to run two Grazing Naturally workshops with Dick Richardson this month. Local graziers had the chance to learn about the basics of ecology, plant growth and the principles of Grazing Naturally, as well as the soil building process, the carbon cycle, and the functioning of ecological communities in relation to soil building.
